Dear Parents, Carers, and Friends of St Joseph's,

As we continue to settle into the new school year, I wanted to take a moment to celebrate the many wonderful things already happening across our school community — and to further introduce myself as your new Headteacher.

### What does a 'typical' day look like?

I spend a lot of time in classrooms, informally visiting children and staff throughout the day. I also enjoy being outside for as many mornings and afternoons as possible to greet and say farewell to pupils and their families. I try to learn every name — it's important to me to get to know everyone in our school community. Please do continue to introduce yourself.

## What is my leadership style?

I lead with my heart — as a dad, a son, and a friend. I believe in developing compassionate and meaningful systems that bring consistency to how we approach challenges. I genuinely feel privileged to do this job.

## What is the best piece of leadership advice I've received?

To put the child at the center of every decision. Any decision made with the child or children at its heart is a good one.

#### What do I enjoy most about the job?

Working in education is incredibly rewarding. I love getting to know people. It can be tough at times, but when you see someone shine — whether it's a child, a staff member, or someone in our wider community — it's amazing. When someone believes in you, that's when people thrive.

## What are the key challenges facing the education sector?

Finance affects every school. As Headteacher, I must make the best decisions with children at the center, while being realistic about the resources available.

#### What changes or improvements are planned for this academic year and beyond?

Right now, I'm doing a lot of listening. I'm proud of our school community — especially our children, who typically behave exceptionally well. I have two daughters, and they've taught me that sometimes, when you quietly work hard and behave well, you can be overlooked in a busy classroom. This year, we're introducing new rewards to celebrate pupils who consistently meet our high expectations – if they 'stay in green.'

At St Joseph's, the overwhelming majority of children beautifully behave every day, and they will be regularly recognised and rewarded. For the small number who occasionally fall short with their behaviour, we'll continue to offer support to help them meet our standards consistently.

We're also beginning to refine our writing curriculum. I believe writing is a powerful way for children to show what they understand, know, and can do.

My pledge to you is that we will strive for excellence in all that we do, inspired by Gospel values. I want all in our community to flourish.

## What has been your proudest achievement, both personally and professionally?

I'm a family person, so my greatest achievement is my family. Alongside my wife Clare, I've had the privilege of raising two wonderful daughters. Rachel is training to be a sports journalist in Manchester, and Alison has just

started Sixth Form. Professionally, my proudest achievement is knowing that the schools I've had the privilege to lead continue to thrive.
